What is an IEP?

Once it is determined that a student meets the criteria to receive special education and related services an Individualized Educational Plan (IEP) is composed.

- Written statement of the educational program designed to meet the student's individual needs
- Developed by a team
- Includes a detailed description which will support student needs
- Will change based on student needs

Who is on the IEP Team?



- Parents/Guardians
- Student (usually starting at 8th grade meeting)
- General Education Teacher
- Special Education Teacher
- School Administrator
- Evaluation Personnel
- Related Service Providers

+ IEP Timelines



- Initial Evaluation or Reevaluation must occur within 60 school days from written parental consent
- Notification will be provided at least 10 days prior to IEP meeting
- The IEP must be reviewed at least once a year
- IEP meeting can be convened at any time to discuss revisions
- Parents will receive IEP goal updates with the school report card

*What Does an IEP Include?

- m Present levels of academic performance
- Manual goals and objectives
- Special education and related services
- Access to general education curriculum and special education curriculum
- Modifications, accommodations and supports
- Assessment information
- m Extended School Year (ESY)
- Placement
- Transition services starting at age 14 1/2

Parent Tips: Things to Think About



- m What are the students strengths and interests?
- What are the concerns for the student's education?
- Are the goals rigorous, measurable and achievable?
- What are the supports and services the student needs to make progress on her goals?

What Parents Can Do Before the Meeting



- Make sure you know who will be at the meeting
- If a meeting time does not work for you, request a different time or date
- Share any medical, psychological, or other assessment information
- Have a list of priorities
- Write down any questions you might have

Changes to the IEP



- $\ensuremath{\,^{\square}}$ After the annual review, changes can occur to the IEP without holding a meeting.
- A written amendment may be developed to modify the child's current IEP.
- Parents should understand and agree to the proposed changes and ensure that the change is documented
